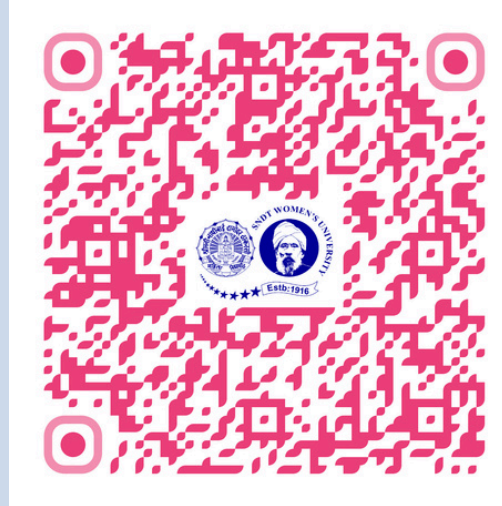

The idea of establishing this Centre originated from the Vision Document, released by the Honorable Chancellor and Governor of Maharashtra, Shri Bhagat Singh Koshyari Ji, on March 22, 2022. This led to the envisioning of BHAGYASY Kendram. Subsequently, aligning with the National Education Policy 2020 and the IKS mission under the Ministry of Education, Government of India, SNDT Women's University, under the vibrant leadership of Hon'ble Vice Chancellor Prof. Ujwala Chakradeo, envisaged the setting up of a Centre deeply committed to Indian knowledge-based approaches and practices. In line with the University's broader vision, the Bharatiya Gyan, Sanskrit evam Yog Kendra (Centre for Indian Knowledge, Sanskrit & Yoga) was inaugurated on September 19, 2022, at the Juhu campus. Since the Vedic period, sages, female sages, and scholars have conveyed societal ideals through stories that address the challenges of Indian life and offer solutions. Indian narrative literature has always nurtured creativity and imagination, shaping the country's history, scientific pursuits, social life, and moral values while earning global recognition. It not only captivates but also enriches society morally, culturally, and spiritually, with its timeless wisdom remaining relevant today. This seminar aims to reconnect participants with India's rich literary heritage, emphasizing the importance of studying, preserving, and passing on this invaluable tradition to future generations.
